
Wives and Daughters


1984

In a future where the attempt to close the divide between the classes has led to a greater separation than ever before, Winston Smith tries to find meaning and connections.




The Catcher in the Rye

Holden Caulfield, after being expelled from his prep school, impulsively takes a train to New York and decides not to return home yet.




The Count of Monte Cristo

Afraid of losing his beauty to age, the young and handsome Dorian Gray sells his soul for eternal youth, and slowly becomes corrupt and evil.




Emma


Jane Eyre
